DOG PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS
HOURS: 7:00 a.m. – Dusk -Daily

1. Dog owners/handlers must clean up after their pets.
2. Dogs with known history of dangerous behavior are prohibited. You are risking harm to others and creating a potential liability to yourself and pet.
3. Dogs must be licensed, vaccinated and must be wearing a collar with identification at all times.
4. Dogs must be leashed and under control prior to entering and upon leaving the Dog Park.
5. Keep gates closed at all times.
6. The San Bruno Dog Park is divided into two dog runs that can be used individually or jointly. When other dogs are present, please consult other dog handlers to determine how the dog run is to be used.
7. Owners/handlers must stay within view and voice control of their dog at all times and monitor behavior.
8. Ask the owner/handlers permission to approach a dog before befriending it.
9. Up to three (3) dogs per adult visit.
10. Dogs in heat and puppies under four (4) months of age are prohibited (as they are not yet protected from diseases).
11. If your dog inflicts an injury, give your name and phone number to the other owner/handler before you leave the area. Owners are legally and financially responsible for their dog's behavior.
12. No glass containers allowed inside the Dog Park and Smoking is not permitted.
13. Young children must be supervised at all times.

The City of San Bruno does not staff the Dog Park. Therefore, the City is unable to ensure that all rules and regulations are followed. It is important that all users read and understand the rules as posted. Dog owners/handlers must “self-police” this facility for it to operate in a safe and functional manner.

This is the City of San Bruno's only Dog Park.
